Don Green met with George, from St. John's Music, opening the conversation about the world of music education and what the festival could accomplish. So began a 35 year relationship linking St. John's Music and the Optimist Band Festival.

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

OPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL BAND FESTIVAL

FIRST 41 YEARS

1976 The inaugural Optimist Club of Assiniboia Band Competition was held on May 1 and featured 11 concert and 5 jazz bands at Sturgeon Creek Regional School. Don Green chaired the festival.

Festival registration quadrupled as 65 concert and jazz bands registered. The festival relocated to the Winnipeg Convention Centre and was held in February. The three day event included a Sock Hop social. George Douglas joined Don Green as festival co-chairmen.

A 40% increase in registrants necessitated that three concert band and three jazz band adjudicators be invited.

Registration was up another 40% as 126 bands registered. A fourth day was added. The final concert featured the South Dakota Symphonic Band and the inaugural performance of the Manitoba Honour Band.

For the third consecutive year registration increased by 40%! Invitations were extended to groups in the United States and the festival expanded to six days. Iowa State University Concert Band joined the Manitoba Honour Band for the Awards Program Concert.

Eight orchestras entered the new orchestra class on Sunday afternoon.

1982 Dr. Tom Frazier, Optimist International Vice President and Don Green, Governor of the Dakotas, Manitoba, Minnesota District of Optimist International attended the Awards Program. The final concert featured the University of Saskatchewan Wind Ensemble and the Phil Nimmons Jazz Quartet.

The final concert was cancelled in favour of finding room for the 201 concert bands, orchestras, jazz bands and combos.

8,000 performers took part in the festival.

The Junior C concert band class (Level One) was shortened to 12 minutes to accommodate all 221 entries. A second jazz band day was added and scheduled in the Convention Center cinema on the last day of the concert band festival.

A fourth concert band adjudicator was added.

1987 While the orchestra class was discontinued due to declining registration, jazz band registration increased by 45%. The record of 51 jazz registrations was not broken for 14 years.

The jazz festival relocated to Grant Memorial Church and Grant Shaw became the jazz festival's sound technician.

The guest concert band was the Winnipeg Wind Ensemble — Orvin Anderson, conductor.

The concert band class designations (Junior A, B, C & Senior A, B, C), age and grade criteria were used for the last time.

1991 Concert band classes were renamed and matched with the difficulty of music. Stage time for Level 1 (formerly Junior C) was shortened to 11 minutes and Level 2 to 13 minutes.

A fifth concert band adjudicator and a second stage was added to allow for a post performance workshop. Level 1 class time returned to 15 minutes.

1993 225 bands attended.

1994 180 concert and 38 jazz bands attended.

The festival celebrated its 20th anniversary by adding a fourth jazz festival adjudicator, introducing post performance jazz workshops, and relocating the jazz festival to the centre cultural franco-manitobain. Festival registration eclipsed the 1988 record by one.

After 20 years of stewardship by the Assiniboia Optimist Club, the festival became a joint project of the Optimist Clubs of Assiniboia, River East, St. James, Seven Oaks, South Winnipeg and Transcona. The jazz band event moved to Glenlawn Collegiate and took place one week after the concert band festival.

Festival registration matched the previous high (234) and 1997 was the first of 6 consecutive years in which the festival registration increased.

Staggered meal breaks and a sixth concert band adjudicator were required to accommodate the record 208 concert band registrants. The featured concert band was The Band of 1 Canadian Air Division.

1999 Guest bands at the concert and jazz band award presentations were the University of Manitoba Wind Ensemble and the University of Manitoba Jazz Orchestra respectively, both under the direction of Richard Gillis.

A concert band conductor's video adjudication was introduced and the jazz festival added a third day. John Griffiths was the featured soloist at the Awards Concert. Concert band scheduling pressures were alleviated as a two-day Beginning Band Festival was started in April for Level 1 bands.

303 bands registered including a record 68 jazz bands, and the festival had its first waiting list. The addition of a fifth jazz festival adjudicator brought the total number of adjudicators to 12.

To make room for the Level 2 through 6 groups, Level 1 was no longer offered at the Convention Centre. Attendance at the festival (including the three-day Beginning Band Festival) totaled 358 ensembles, a 61% increase over 6 years and a registration record that remains unsurpassed.

To take pressure off the visiting jazz adjudicators, local band directors adjudicated the Sunday morning session.

The A101 through A701 jazz class designation was used for the last time.

2005 The festival celebrated its 30th anniversary by adding a fifth grading option and redefining the jazz band categories. The Manitoba Band Association and Optimist Clubs amalgamated operations. The clubs provided volunteers and a financial contribution, and the MBA assumed financial and administrative responsibility.

The festival renamed its two major awards to recognize the 30 years of vision, leadership and dedication provided by retired festival co-chairmen, Don Green and George Douglas. John Balsillie took over as chairperson. The Level One Festival (formely the Beginning Band Festival relocated to North Kildonan Mennonite Brethren Church.

CD recordings were introduced and class time for Level 2 was lengthened. The Level One Festival offered a Level 1B option and expanded to five days (including a day in Brandon) to accommodate the 100 registrants.

Strong jazz festival registration necessitated that the festival begin on Friday afternoon.

The introduction of the Louis Riel holiday necessitated that the concert band festival week be held in one less day. Space on the Convention Centre's second floor, a third stage and two adjudicators were added. Two additional adjudicators were also brought in to meet the demands of the jazz festival.

2010 Clinic time at the jazz festival was doubled and the event was expanded to three full days. Starting the festival on Thursday necessitated a venue change to North Kildonan Mennonite Brethren Church.

A record 29 adjudicators were needed to meet the needs of the Optimist Concert Band, Optimist Jazz Band and Level One Festivals.

More than 100 volunteers were required to staff the festival. A combination of Optimist Club members, New Horizon Band members and band parents help fill the positions.

A blizzard resulted in a record single day number of cancelations (11). Two adjudicators did not arrive until the afternoon of the first day.

A new method of recording bands was tested at the Jazz & Level One Festival, improving the recording for the bands. This will be expanded to all Concert bands in 2015.

The Level One Festival hit a record high of 120 ensembles and required the addition of a second day in Brandon. Bill Kristjanson stepped in as Festival Chairperson. New recording method on SD cards was implemented at all festival. New partnership including community and financial support from Winnipeg's Classic 107 Radio was established.

New Beginning Jazz Class for the younger groups was created and an increase in Jazz Registration corresponded. Second floor added at the Winnipeg convention centre adding a performing stage and increased clinic time.







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




















































































Remembering Ken Epp Projects

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

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






EONCERT Hadjudicators

Dr. Jason Caslor is Assistant
Professor of Music and Associate
Director of Bands and Orchestras
at Arizona State University. In
addition to directing the Wind
Ensemble and Philharmonia,
he also mentors graduate
conducting students, and
teaches undergraduate and
graduate conducting courses.

From 2010-2015, Caslor served

as Assistant Professor of Instrumental Conducting at Memorial University in St. John's, Newfoundland, Canada where he conducted the Wind Ensemble and oversaw the undergraduate and graduate instrumental conducting programs. Prior to that, he spent three seasons as Resident Conductor with the Thunder Bay Symphony Orchestra (TBSO). During his tenure with the TBSO, he conducted over 75 concerts (including a CBC Radio national broadcast) and recorded a full-length, internationally distributed CD with Canadian blues artist Rita Chiarelli. Recipient of an "Excellence in Teaching Award" from Memorial University's Students' Union in 2012, Caslor also spent several years teaching in the public school system as an instrumental and choral instructor.

In addition to numerous regional engagements, Caslor conducted the 2016 National Youth Band of Canada and has presented his research at the 2016 Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, the 2015 WASBE International Conference, and the 2013 CBDNA National Conference. JONATHAN DAGENAIS



Jonathan Dagenais holds a Masters degree (M.Mus) in Wind Orchestra Conducting from *McGill University*, supervised by Mr. Alain Cazes, and a Bachelor's degree (B.Mus) in Composition from the *Université de Montréal*.

In addition to CEGEP/university teaching (music theory, composition, ear training, musicianship and conducting), Mr. Dagenais is also pursuing a career as a composer for wind orchestra. His works have been performed repeatedly by many Canadian university ensembles (McGill University, Université de Sherbrooke, University of Toronto, University of Manitoba, etc.), they appear on several professional recordings and some have been listed in MusicFest Canada's concert band syllabus since 2009. Mr. Dagenais' works are currently published throughout the world by Eighth Note Publications, Hafabra Music and GAM Publishing.

Jonathan Dagenais has a very active conducting career. Since 2005, he has acted as the conductor and artistic director of the *Orchestre à Vents Non Identifié (OVNI)*, a Montreal wind orchestra he co-founded. This ensemble is dedicated to collaborative and active listening, tone quality, refined interpretation as well as adopting a humoristic approach. In 2010 and 2011, he was appointed conductor of the *McGill Wind Symphony* and he was a guest conductor for the *Montreal Pop Symphony Orchestra (OSPM)* in 2012. He has also been conducting the *Cercle Philharmonique de Saint-Jean-sur-Richelieu* since September 2012. Finally, since September 2015, he has been the conductor of the *Orchestre de jeux vidéo - OJV (Montreal Video Game Orchestra)*, an ensemble dedicated to video game soundtracks. Being a longtime fan of video games and their music, this was a natural marriage of his two passions.

Every year, Mr. Dagenais is hired by summer music camps in Québec to conduct orchestras, bands and chamber music groups. He has been a guest conductor for many Canadian honor bands and is also regularly selected to adjudicate and/or give clinics at more than 25 Canadian music contests and festivals (*MusicFest Canada, Atlantic Band Festival, Winnipeg International Band Festival, St. John's Rotary Music Festival,* etc.). Most notably, Jonathan was appointed as the conductor of the *National Youth Band of Canada (NYB)* for the 2013 edition in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, it being the most prestigious honorary band in the country.

Mr. Dagenais will be guest teacher at McGill University in 2017-2018 and is planning doctoral studies in conducting in the coming years.

Leah McGray is the Director of Instrumental Studies for the Department of Music at Rhodes College in Memphis, Tennessee. Dr. McGray conducts the Rhodes Orchestra, Rhodes Wind Ensemble, teaches classes in conducting and music appreciation. In addition to her work at Rhodes College, she is the conductor for Memphis Symphony Orchestra's "Leading from Every Chair" program and a guest conductor with the Memphis Youth Symphony Orchestra.

Dr. McGray earned her Doctor of Musical Arts in conducting at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, where she studied with Dr. Mallory Thompson. She is the co-director of a Toronto-based wind and choral chamber group Windago, that is dedicated to the performance of music by emerging Canadian composers. A two-time winner of Social Science Humanities and Research Council grants from the Canadian government, her research focuses on new works written for the wind ensemble, with an emphasis on the works for winds by Baltimore composer Joel Puckett.

McGray received her Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Education degrees from Acadia University, in Nova Scotia, Canada and taught band and orchestra in public schools in Eastern Canada before completing the Master of Music degree in wind conducting from the University of Toronto. Professional affiliations include the College Band Directors National Association, College Music Society, Canadian Band Association, Canadian Music Educators Association, National Association for Music Education, and the Nova Scotia Band Association.

His post-secondary experience also includes assignments at the University of Manitoba and Iowa Wesleyan College.

Originally from Winnipeg, Manitoba, Dr. Oehlerking earned his Doctor of Musical Arts in Wind Conducting at The University of Iowa, where he studied with Dr. Myron Welch. He also studied with Dr. Dale J. Lonis at the University of Manitoba, where he earned his Masters in Music Performance with an emphasis in Conducting. His undergraduate work was also at Manitoba, where he earned separate Bachelors degrees in Music and Education.

Prior to his appointment at Saskatchewan, Dr. Oehlerking taught a wide variety of students and musicians at the primary, secondary and post-secondary levels. His ensembles have enjoyed success at the local, national and international levels, garnering outstanding performance awards and showcase invitations from a variety of organizations. In July 2015, the University of Saskatchewan Wind Orchestra had the honour of performing at the bi-annual conference of the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles in San Jose, California. In 2013 the ensemble performed at the Jungfrau Festival in Interlachen, Switzerland and the World Music Contest in Kerkrade. Netherlands.

Dr. Oehlerking is the President of the Canadian Band Association, a Past President of the Saskatchewan Band Association, and is also a Yamaha Artist/Educator. He belongs to several other professional organizations, including the Saskatchewan Music Educators Association, Manitoba Band Association, College Band Directors National Association, WASBE, and Pi Kappa Lambda. Dr. Oehlerking has conducted ensembles, served as an adjudicator, conference presenter and clinician across Canada, as well as in the United States, United Kingdom, Germany, Switzerland and the Netherlands.

James Popejoy is Director of Bands and a Professor of Music at the University of North Dakota. Conductor of the Wind Ensemble and University Band, he instructs graduate and undergraduate courses in conducting, instrumental literature, and jazz pedagogy. Under his direction, the University of North Dakota Wind Ensemble has been selected to present performances at the 2001, 2005,

2008, 2011, and 2017 North Dakota Music Educators Association Conferences; the 2002 Inaugural North Dakota Arts & Humanities Summit; the 2006 College Band Directors National Association North Central Division Conference; and the 2012 Western International Band Clinic. In addition, he conducted the UND Faculty Chamber Players in concert at the 2010 CBDNA-NC Division Conference.

Dr. Popejoy holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Central Missouri State University; the Master of Arts degree in Conducting from the University of Iowa; and earned the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Conducting with a minor in Jazz Studies from the University of North Texas. He has been selected for numerous awards and honors, including most recently the *Outstanding Faculty Award* from the UND chapter of Gamma Sigma Alpha; the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the CMSU Department of Music; Educator of the Year for the North Dakota Music Educators Association; two North Dakota Spirit Faculty Achievement Awards; the UND Faculty Award for Individual Excellence in Teaching; and the Citation of Excellence from the National Band Association. Dr. Popejoy has Resource Guides published in each volume of the "Teaching Music Through Performance in Band" series, having also served as a production assistant and performer on many of the recordings that accompany this resource material. In his seventeenth year at UND, he served as Director of Bands and Percussion Studies at McLennan Community College in Texas for five years; was a public school music educator in Missouri for nine years; and has founded and conducted numerous adult and student community ensembles.

Dr. Popejoy is a member of CBDNA, WASBE, NBA, NAfME, PAS, JEN, Manitoba Band Association, North Dakota National Band Association, and the North Dakota Music Educators Association, and has served on the Executive Boards for NDMEA, NDNBA, and CBDNA. In addition, he is the advisor for the UND NAfME Collegiate chapter. Currently serving as President of the North Central Division of the College Band Directors National Association, he remains active as a classical and jazz percussionist, clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor.

COLLEEN RICHARDSON



Dr. Colleen Richardson is the Coordinator of Bands and directs the Wind Ensemble at Western University in London, Ontario, the second largest music program in Canada. She teaches undergraduate music education classes, graduate courses in conducting and wind literature, and supervises

the Western Young Winds program, which is a community outreach band for students in grades six to nine taught by undergraduate music education majors. Under her direction, the Western University Wind Ensemble has produced two CDs, *Apparitions* (Albany Records, 2011) and *Explorations* (Mark Records, 2016); both recordings are available through itunes and Amazon.com.

Besides being active as a clinician, adjudicator and guest conductor nationally, Dr. Richardson has guest conducted or presented her research at conferences in Ireland, Switzerland, Italy, Taiwan, Indonesia, Japan, Wales, and the US. Her research focuses on wind literature, conducting pedagogy, and ensemble rehearsal techniques. Publications include articles for the *Canadian Winds*, and the *Canadian Music Educator Journal*, as well as study guides within eight volumes of the Teaching Music Through Performance in Band series. In 2012, Dr. Richardson produced and edited the Hunsberger DVD within GIA's DVD set entitled *Three Icons: Frank Battisti, Donald Hunsberger, and H. Robert Reynolds*.

A native of Winnipeg, Dr. Richardson graduated from Brandon University (BMus Ed), the University of Calgary (Wind Conducting Diploma, MMus Conducting), and the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music (DMA Wind Conducting). Her primary conducting teachers have been Rodney Winther and Glenn Price. However, she has also had opportunities to study with many other well respected composers and conductors, including: Craig Kirchhoff, Karel Husa, Warren Benson, David Maslanka, Eugene Corporon, Mallory Thompson, Robert Reynolds, and Jerry Junkin.

While in Cincinnati completing her doctorate, Dr. Richardson co-directed the Tri-State Chamber Players, as well as served as the Music Director and Conductor of the Cincinnati Youth Wind Ensemble. Prior to her graduate studies, she taught general, choral, and instrumental music in the Canadian school system for 14 years.

Currently, Dr. Richardson serves on the boards of WASBE (World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles) and the OBA (Ontario Band Association). She is also active on the CBDNA Music Education Committee (College Band Directors National Association).

Dr. Smart is the Director of Bands and Trumpet at the University of Montana where he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, teaches applied trumpet, undergraduate and graduate conducting, and music education courses. Under his direction, the Symphonic Wind Ensemble was selected to perform at the joint Western/Northwestern Region College Band Directors National Association Conference in Reno, NV and the NAfME All-Northwest Conference in Portland, OR. Dr. Smart is also

the founder, producer, and co-conductor of the annual Fusion Concert where over 25 acts showcase the diversity of the UM School of Music in one seamless stream of music. For outreach to the greater musical community, Dr. Smart also organizes and conducts the UM All-Star High School Wind Ensemble Festival that has attracted students from five states and Canada, the UM Concert Band Festival, and the annual UM Summer Music Camp.

Dr. Smart was invited to attend the International Ensemble Modern Academy in Schwaz, Austria and study under the tutelage of conductors, Michael Gielen and Franck Ollu, as well as the musicians of Ensemble Modern. The experience resulted in two public performances with IEMA members from 30 conservatories across the globe at the Klangspuren New Music Festival in Schwaz and Innsbruck, Austria.

Dr. Smart is in demand as a conductor and clinician having performed/presented in Austria, Arizona, Canada, Idaho, Montana, Michigan, Nevada, New Mexico, Ohio, Texas, Washington, and Utah. He has also presented at several state MENC affiliate conventions as well as the 2011 CBDNA National Convention in Seattle. Other conducting experiences include the International Ensemble Modern Academy (Schwaz, Austria), Conductors Retreat at Medomak (Washington, ME), the International Workshop for Orchestral Conducting (Graz, Austria), and the Band Conductors Art Symposium (Ann Arbor, MI). Dr. Smart taught public school in Lapeer, MI.

He, his wife Amy, son Benjamin, and daughters Natalie and Caroline live in Missoula.

It also allows teachers and performers to listen to other bands and to hear what people in other schools or communities are doing.


A concert band is a collection of woodwind, brass & percussion performers ranging in size from as few as 20 members to as large as 100 or more. There are no string instruments but you will see flutes, clarinets, trumpets, trombones, saxes, piccolo, bassoon, oboe, baritones & euphoniums, French horns, tubas, plus a full range of percussion instruments.


A jazz band typically includes 3-5 trumpets, 3-5 trombones, 3-5 saxophones and 3-5 member rhythm section.

Each ensemble is graded by two or three adjudicators who are situated across the hall. Each adjudicator gives a verbal or written adjudication and assigns a grade of one, two, three, four or five star. Ensembles who receive one or more five star ratings receive a trophy for superior performance.

All groups who receive at least one five star or two four star ratings at the Festival are eligible for MusicFest 2017 and MusicFest 2018 Nationals.

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

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

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JAZZ BAND Hadjudicators

GORDON FOOTE



Gordon Foote is currently associate dean, performance & public events and professor in the Faculty of Music, University of Toronto. As part of the Jazz Studies Program, he directs the University of Toronto Jazz Orchestra (UTJO).

Under the direction of Professor Foote, the UTIO has released two CD's, one entitled Reflections, featuring U of T faculty member Mike Murley on tenor saxophone, and a second entitled Sweet Ruby Suite, featuring

the music of Kenny Wheeler with guests, vocalist Norma Winstone and soprano sax. Dave Liebman.

Previous to that, Foote spent 26 years as a professor in the Jazz Studies Program at the Schulich School of Music of McGill University, in Montreal, Quebec. He served as dean (interim), associate dean (academic and student affairs), chair of the Department of Performance, director of graduate studies and chair of the Jazz Area. Before that he was a professor for six years at St. FX University in Nova Scotia.

Foote is one of the pioneers of jazz education in Canada, being instrumental in the development and implementation of the first undergraduate and graduate university jazz studies programs in the country.

Foote was the coordinator of the McGill Jazz Orchestras, and directed McGill Jazz Orchestra I. Under his direction the ensemble performed throughout the United States, Canada, France, Switzerland, England, Ireland and Mexico. The ensemble released nine compact discs and was recognized internationally as one of the finest university jazz ensembles anywhere.

As a saxophonist and clinician for Conn-Selmer, Gordon has performed in Canada, Europe and the United States. His studies at the University of Minnesota and the University of North Texas combined with 42 years of performing and teaching experience, leave him as probably the most requested adjudicator, conductor, clinician and jazz educator/performer in Canada.

Greg Gatien is currently in his first year serving as Dean at Brandon University's School of Music, where he has been a long-time member of the jazz faculty. With a wealth of experience teaching saxophone, jazz pedagogy, improvisation, jazz history,

and directing ensembles, Greg is an active educator and maintains a busy schedule adjudicating festivals, directing honor bands, and giving masterclasses and workshops. Also an active and accomplished performer, Greg has played with many icons of the jazz tradition, including Kenny Wheeler, Benny Carter, Joe Henderson, and Bob Brookmeyer. He has been featured on numerous recordings and radio broadcasts in both Canada and the US. Greg is a frequent collaborator with renowned American pianist and composer John Harmon and has been a regular member of the Winnipeg Jazz Orchestra since 2002.

MARTY OLIVAS



Marty, a recording and touring artist with over 25 years experience, is a native of El Paso, Texas. After graduating from Burges High School in 1985, he went on to earn a bachelor's degree in music education from the University of Texas at El Paso and a master's degree in trumpet performance from New Mexico State University.

As an educator, Marty has worked in El Paso for the Ysleta ISD for eighteen years in which

for six years he taught at Bel Air High School as the Assistant Band Director and Director of Jazz Studies. Currently, Marty is a Fine Arts Instructional Specialist with the Ysleta ISD Fine Arts Department. In addition, Mr. Olivas is also a Yamaha Performing Artist and frequently serves as a clinician and adjudicator throughout the United States. Mr. Olivas is the Artistic Director and co-founder of the El Paso Youth Jazz Ensemble that is going into their sixth season performing at Jazz Festivals and clubs throughout the El Paso area. This group consists of 21 high school students who audition for this group. Also known as EPYJE, this opportunity was created to further their education in jazz studies throughout their high school career.

As a performer, Mr. Olivas joined jazz-fusion group, Billy Townes and Modern Sessions in 1991. In 1992 he assembled EI Paso's premier mainstream jazz quintet, Marty Olivas and Jazz Q, which released their first CD, *Jazz at the Dome*, in 1999. For the past 10 years Marty has lead the 15-piece big band, *The Eklektic Jazz Group*; each member of this group (as is the case with almost all of his performing groups) is a certified music educator and takes great interest in keeping the American art form of Jazz alive by educating young people through master classes, clinics and performances.

In 2005, Marty Olivas and Shade Records released his CD, *Being Gemini*, which can be purchased through Barnes and Noble, Olivas Music Center in El Paso, TX, or online at **www.shaderecords.com**. His latest project with his latest group *CASE CLOSED* has recently released a new CD entitled *Agree To Disagree*. This project includes Ruben Gutierrez on piano, Erik Unsworth on bass, Ricky Malichi on drums, with special appearances by Brad Leali on saxophone and Arath Corral on guitar.

Bassist, composer and educator Ashley Summers is a Canadian-born, Chicago-based artist whose talents have brought her to stages all over the world. Summers has brought her "glorious tone that pours forth passion and groove" (Jazzreview.com, 2010) to the North Sea Jazz Festival, the Umbria Jazz Festival.

For more than a decade, Summers has been leading her own large and small ensembles in an effort to showcase her original music and the extraordinary talent of her peers in Canada, the US and Europe. Recently, the title track on Summers's upcoming ears&eyes Records release, 'True North', was recognized by the International Society for Jazz Arrangers and Composers as the 2017 "Outstanding New Music Composition" in the small ensemble category. The piece will be performed by members of the Chuck Owen Big Band at ISJCA's annual symposium in Tampa, FL, in May 2017.

In addition to her busy performance schedule, Summers is an in-demand educator. For several years she served as director of IAJE Canada's "Jazzmobile" project, which placed professional jazz musicians in Canadian schools to motivate, educate and inspire young musicians. She also frequently serves as an adjudicator, guest artist and clinician at festivals and universities throughout Canada and the US and has held interim faculty appointments at the Cleveland Institute of Music, Ashland University and Kent State University and recently completed a full-time visiting Jazz Studies faculty position at Morehead State University in Kentucky.

Although she is a proud Canadian citizen, Summers is thrilled to be in Chicago, IL, where she is perpetually developing her own projects and supporting a variety of exciting local and international artists in jazz and other genres. Her long-awaited debut album as a leader, featuring saxophonist Seamus Blake, is scheduled to be released on March 24th. 2017, on the ears&eves Records label.

He has served as a clinician at a wide range of conferences, festivals, camps, and schools across Canada, teaches drum set during Jazz week at the International Music Camp, and continues to maintain a private studio of students as well. Graydon is also a highly sought after freelance drummer and regularly performs in a variety musical projects including, The Winnipeg Jazz Collective and Chameleon. He has performed in a multitude of festivals and venues across Canada with the likes of Michael Cain, Dean McNeil, Greg Gatien, the Nuphunk Orchestra, the Winnipeg Jazz Collective, and the Littleford/Carter quintet.

CHAD POLLARD Chad Pollard is currently teaching at Fort Richmond Collegiate. He spent the previous 14 years at Linden Christian School where he was Performing Arts Department Head and Senior Years Band/Jazz Director. Chad began his teaching career as a middle years band and music teacher. He was also an adjunct professor at Canadian Mennonite University for 10 years where he directed the jazz band and taught jazz pedagogy. Chad began his music career as a freelance saxophone player. He has performed across Canada, in the USA and Europe. He has also been a guest clinician in public schools and universities across Western Canada and in the USA. He has been a frequent adjudicator at the Manitoba Band Association's Level 1 Festival as well as the Solo & Ensemble Festival. BRIAN ZIMMERMAN Brian studied Jazz Guitar Performance at Concordia University in Montreal and Music Education as a Masters student - with a focus on Jazz Pedagogy at Brandon University. He has had a wide variety of performance and recording experience, and continues to perform as a jazz guitarist in and around Winnipeg and Brandon. He has been teaching the jazz guitar studio at BU since 2008 and Jazz and band at Maples Collegiate in Winnipeg since 2000.

BRADY GILL Brady Gill teaches instrumental and choral music at Collège Pierre-Elliott-Trudeau in the River East Transcona School Division. Brady has been a music educator in Manitoba since 1997, teaching at the junior and senior high school levels. He was a member of the Manitoba Arts Curriculum (Music) writing team from 2003-2013, and served on the Board of the Manitoba Band Association from 2000-2004.

Brady directed the Junior (2011) and Intermediate (2012) Manitoba Honour Jazz Bands. He was guest conductor of the River East Transcona School Division Grade 9-10 Concert Band with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra in 2014.

Currently, he directs the Canadian Mennonite University Jazz Ensemble, and serves as artistic director of the Westside Band, a community jazz ensemble. Brady has served as an adjudicator at the Manitoba Band Association Level One Band Festival for several years and is excited to be working with young jazz students at this year's festival.

STEVE HAMILTON Steve Hamilton has been an active member of the Manitoba music scene for over 30 years both as a music educator and professional bassist. He currently teaches band at John Taylor Collegiate where he has an active concert band and jazz band program. In addition, Steve has also taught at the International Music Camp and the University of Manitoba Jazz Camps as well as numerous clinics and festivals throughout the province. 

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
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
